

## PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

There is no doubt that it has been a fortnight filled with mixed emotions. My thanks to the families who have reached out to seek clarification, support, and advice; the support has been greatly appreciated as we have navigated some key changes. We appreciate that there is still some uncertainty moving forward; however we are well prepared as a school and as an Education Directorate.

Key changes include the cancellation of all school excursions, sporting carnivals, camps and whole school

events. We have also made changes to include the reduction of whole grade level gatherings and events. As we work through the coming weeks, we will have greater clarity around how long this will continue.

To further reduce the risk to our students, staff and the community, we have engaged in more regular hand washing. This includes at the start and end of the day, as well as before and after eating. We are completing more regular checks throughout the day to ensure soap is available at all times. We also ordered bulk hand sanitiser for each classroom a fortnight ago and we are waiting for these supplies to arrive. There are some great YouTube clips which teach about how to wash hands thoroughly, in a fun way, for students. We have also implemented explicit hygiene lessons from preschool to year 10 which focus on hygiene practices, safer sneezing practices and when to ask for help if a student feels unwell. We encourage families to talk openly with their child/ren about the need for good hygiene practices and the reason for this. While we do not want to alarm or frighten students, being informed is important so they are also able to protect themselves.

A reminder to all families that if you are returning from overseas, a 14 day selfquarantine is in place. If a member of the family comes into direct contact with a confirmed case of COVID-19, families are required to self-quarantine for 14 days.

The aim of all of these changes is to support our Government to flatten the curve of the rate of spread and protect the vulnerable.

I encourage all families to stay alert and stay informed. With school now back for the year we are encouraging all parents and carers to make parking safety a priority! # Why orange?



- more than 70 Indigenous languages are spoken in Australia.



## Maths

In maths we have been looking at patterns through our own daily lives. We learnt the days of the week, drew the seasons of the year on whiteboards and used numicon shapes to create different patterns. We talked about the importance of learning we are proud of all our learning so far this term.

#### Literacy

In our literacy learning we are reading Wombat Stew and Possum Magic. 1/2M decided to

make Wombat Stew with Miss Kristie and collected natural materials from DG square to add to the black tub. We all danced around the bubbling billy singing "Wombat Stew, Wombat Stew, hot and spicy oh so nicey, Wombat Stew". We have been exploring narratives and analysing the sentence structures in different stories. In 1/2W the students used post it notes to demonstrate the characters in the story and understand how to construct the sequence of the Wombat stew story.

Piet Mondrian has been our artistic influencer who used primary colours in most of his work. We used his artwork as inspiration for our collage work.

# Inquiry

Inquiry education is a new way of learning where students let their curiosity and questioning guide them through big understandings. In History the students have been exploring our families and significant times in our lives by creating a timeline and labelling or drawing events in our lives which are significant to us. In our classrooms we discussed different family types and comparing the different roles our parents and siblings play in our lives. Over the past few weeks many students in the Kurrajong unit have brought in lots of different types of family trees and pictures of our families for our speaking and listening presentations for news in our classrooms.

On Thursdays the students have been busy learning and improving their motor skills through rolling, drippling a ball, balancing on the balance beams and rolling on the scooter boards.
