This build is a significant investment for our school costing over half a million dollars. We cannot wait to deliver the playground in mid May 2023! I offer my sincere thanks to Veronika Pasalic from ACT Education for her incredible leadership and support; Veronika was a huge driving force in supporting us to bring our student plans into reality and I am beyond grateful.

Glass Items at School

We understand that for many reasons, families might choose to use glass drink bottles or containers for their young people to use. We are requesting that where possible, students do not bring glass items to school, including glass bottles of soft drink. We have had a number of items broken within the playground which have required quick clean up to reduce any risk to our students. Just as we are nut free, we are aiming to be glass free also. We greatly appreciate your support with this across the year.

Medication at School

If children or young people need to take medication during school hours, please fill in an "Authority to Administer Medication" form which is available from the front office. If a doctor prescribes the medication, it is also preferable to have the doctor sign the form. Due to Directorate policy, school staff are unable to administer medication without this authority. All medication to be administered must be in the medication container/box from the chemist with dosage and time of administration and handed to the front office staff.

Students with Medical Conditions

It is important that information for students with medical conditions is accurate and detailed to help us provide appropriate care. If there are changes to your child's health or medical circumstances during the year, please contact the front office to inform them of the changes and complete the required documentation to ensure your child receives the appropriate first aid care. We appreciate your assistance in this matter.

Supporting your Child's Education

At the start of most school years, there is discussion in the press about school fees, government funding and voluntary contributions. We aim to provide the best possible education for every child enrolled at Caroline Chisholm School. In order to meet the needs of every child, class teachers and educators regularly participate in professional learning and discussions, assess and group students and of course plan, teach and review lessons. To support this focus on quality practice, all voluntary contributions go directly towards providing resources for students. As stated, the contribution is voluntary and payment details are confidential. No child misses out because their family is unable to make the contribution. You can contribute towards your child's education even if you cannot pay the full amount. You may also choose to set up a payment schedule with regular payments made over the year or term. Please see Beth on the senior campus to discuss how to set this arrangement up. If you would like to pay a larger amount it will most certainly be gratefully received.

BASE Assessment (kindergarten)

The kindergarten teachers have commenced the BASE testing for 2023. Across the weeks you will see some different faces teaching in kindergarten to enable our teachers to complete this assessment with every child. Staff will ensure that the regular learning program continues throughout the testing period.

What is BASE? If you have had a child move through kindergarten before, you might remember an assessment process called PIPS. This year, BASE has replaced PIPS. BASE is a computer-based assessment program that assesses the early literacy, numeracy, and personal, social/emotional skills of students in kindergarten. Our kindergarten teachers value this opportunity to work individually for a sustained time with each of their students. All students in ACT Government Schools undertake this assessment. BASE assists with:

- determining what kindergarten students know when they enter primary school
- assessing the progress of students in literacy, numeracy, and phonological awareness (sounds in language) and personal, social, and emotional learning
- diagnosing individual student work and providing information to indicate what students are achieving or understanding
- predicting future performance
- identifying students who might benefit from early targeted intervention or enrichment. This assessment is administered in the first month at school. The second assessment is administered early in term four and shows how your child has progressed relative to their starting point in the first assessment. We use the information gleaned from BASE together with our school-based assessments to ensure all students succeed at Caroline Chisholm School.

SC Chromebook Care

At the start of each year students often forget the importance of charging their Chromebook the night before. We are seeking your support to remind your young person at home that when they are charging their phone or other personal devices, to remember to charge their Chromebook. In the high school the Chromebook has become one of the most used learning tools. It is the main way that students access their Google Classroom, their major way of researching, and most importantly a significant tool for differentiation that teachers use to meet the needs of the learners in their classes. Keeping their devices safe, clean, and charged is a wonderful habit we are trying to build in all our students.


KINDERGARTEN NEWS




Fine Motor

MATHS







YEAR 8 NEWS

NAPLAN testing will occur in our school between 15 and 27 March 2023.

Education ministers agreed that NAPLAN would move to Term One from 2023. This will mean results will be available to education authorities earlier in the year to inform school and system teaching and learning programs and will assist teachers to better determine support students need for the coming year.

NAPLAN Online is a more engaging assessment that adjusts questions to each student's achievement level.

NAPLAN provides valuable information to schools and parents about literacy and numeracy achievement. It supports school improvement processes by enabling teachers to monitor student progress over time and to identify areas of strength and development.

All eligible students are encouraged and supported to participate in NAPLAN testing. Visit www.nap.edu.au to see interactive versions of the test and for more information.
