PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

With two weeks left of term one, I thought I would take the opportunity to share our progress towards our latest strategic priorities.

P-10 our teachers are currently working in professional learning teams to review the scope and sequence of curriculum planning documents at the school. This has included evaluating the relevance of curriculum to student needs and ensuring full coverage of the Australian Curriculum Achievement Standards. Longer term they will commence a review of the way in which the general capabilities are taught and assessed for student growth. We look forward to sharing further updates about curriculum development in the coming months.



On the JC, staff are working to embed the 10 Essential Literacy Practices after establishing these practices in 2020. The essential practices focus on improving students' literacy knowledge, understandings and skills through the following 10 practices:

- Deliberate efforts to foster motivation and engagement within and across lessons
- Read-alouds of age appropriate books and other materials, print or digital
- Flexible groups targeted to student need in specific aspects of literacy development
- Activities that build phonological awareness
- Explicit instruction in letter-sound relationships (phonics)
- Research-informed writing instruction
- Intentional and ambitious efforts to build vocabulary and content knowledge
- Abundant reading material and reading opportunities in the classroom
- Ongoing observation and assessment of children's language and literacy development that informs their education
- Collaboration with families in promoting literacy

Key changes to practice include the way in which we teach reading, with a movement to a 'workshop' model. The workshops use evidence of student understandings to create small groups which teachers work closely with to move learning to the next progression point. This has meant that teaching reading strategies as opposed to teaching a reading level is a consistent practice in our reading instruction. We will be expanding the workshop model to include learner focused writing instruction throughout the year.

The Year 9 cohort have officially moved into Senior Years, and are now working towards obtaining their Year 10 Certificate. This can mean a lot of changes and opportunities. For the first time, students in Years 9 and 10 have three elective classes.

Students in Year 9 are encouraged to touch base with Ms Tigwell, to consider the opportunities that work experience can bring, whether it be to explore a possible career option, or gain experience in a working environment.

In Humanities and Social Science (HASS), students are exploring geography, business and economics through the trade unit. Students have gained a new understanding on how interconnected we are with countries around the world due to trade and consumerism. In the last week, students have been analysing the impacts that fast fashion has on today's society environmentally, economically and socially. In the coming weeks, students will be working on their persuasive writing presenting an argument on the positive and negative impacts of fast fashion.



In Outdoor Education, Mr Davis has been keeping all his classes busy with canoe camping trips. These 2-night camps include students canoeing from Shallow Crossing back to Nelligen. Students who attended in Week 6 experienced the constant rain and early mornings. We hope that the remaining camps have a little more sunshine! Have a look at some of the moments captured during the camp.

In Drama, students have been learning about the history of theatre. To start with a bang, they have been diving into Greek Theatre. They have been learning about the different conventions in Greek Theatre, while reading the play "Medea" by Euripides. The story centres on Medea, a foreign princess (and descendent of gods), as well as her actions after finding out her husband Jason, is leaving her for a new bride. Students have been exploring the role of the "chorus", an ensemble group who comment on and summarise key events of the play. Students are now rehearsing their scene from "Medea" to demonstrate their interpretation and understanding of the chorus.

International Women's Day Conference:

This year, the International Women Day theme was "Choose to Challenge". Four students from Year 8 to 10 were invited to participate in the International Women's Day Conference. These students had the opportunity to listen to Professor Kim Rubenstein, Kat Berney, Dr Pia Rowe, and Associate Professor Chris Wallace (from the 50/50 Foundation), Nip Wijewijrema (social enterprise entrepreneur), and Dhani Gilbert (Indigenous Advocate). Each guest speaker provided personal anecdotes on the challenges that they, or someone they loved faced due to their gender, and shared their experience to be a voice for change.

Students from various schools around the ACT were then invited to brainstorm, plan and deliver to other participants ways they can change something in the school to better it. Since coming back from the conference, student advocates on the Senior Campus have met together to discuss the various issues raised at the conference, and are planning on working together with school staff to improve the school.





Romeo to Go:

This year the Senior Campus will be putting together a school play: "Romeo to Go". What a busy time it's been! Rehearsals are truly under way. Students from Years 7 to 10 have been rehearsing after school on Mondays and Fridays since Week 4 in preparation for our performances in Term 2. This year, we have been lucky to work with various year groups, allowing for students in senior years to mentor, demonstrate leadership skills, and share their past experiences in school productions to the Years 7 and 8 students, who may not have had this opportunity before.

"Romeo to Go"

focuses around a Year 9/10 Drama class who only have twenty minutes to rehearse before their big performance at the school assembly. With an eccentric Drama teacher, 17 students, and a 10 minute time slot, who knows what interpretation of Shakespeare's famous love tragedy they will bring?

"Romeo to Go" will be performing at Caroline Chisholm School in Term 2, Week 3. Tickets will be available in the coming weeks.



CHIEF MINISTER'S READING CHALLENGE 2021

Caroline Chisholm School Junior Campus students will be participating in the Chief Minister's Reading Challenge starting Monday 22 March until Friday 6 August 2021.

The book reading requirement is 30 books, and students can complete the challenge in one of two ways:

1. Students can make their own book choices, including novels, non-fiction, poetry, or books in a language other than English. Books read to students may also be recorded.

*Optional- Reading a book and then writing a book report can be recorded as two items on the student reading record. The written report shows further engagement and deeper understanding with texts through reading and responding.

2. Students can challenge themselves to read a range of different texts. A list of different types of texts that are to be read in this option is attached.

**Note- Book reports cannot replace an item from the list.*

Each student participating in the challenge will collect an Individual Student Reading Record sheet from their teacher. Each time a book is read, it must be added to the reading record and initialled by a parent, carer, or teacher.

When students have finished reading all the books from their chosen challenge, they will give their Individual Student Reading Record sheet to their teacher. Students will receive a special award at a Friday assembly, acknowledging that they have read 30 books and completed the challenge!

YEAR 3/4 MELALEUCA UNIT

It is hard to believe that the term is almost over already!

We have been learning about narrative writing for the first half of this term. We have learnt about using our five senses to help us describe a setting and using the STEAL technique to describe characters for the reader. We have experimented with different ways to “hook” our reader and have used editing skills to improve the spelling, structure and vocabulary in our writing. This week we have started learning about persuasive writing. Watch out for some persuasive techniques being used by students at home. 😊



In maths we are currently learning about symmetry. We are looking for symmetry in our environment and will be investigating asymmetrical objects at the end of the week. We have covered topics such as place value, number patterns, reading and writing numbers, number lines and 2-D shapes and 3-D objects.

Inquiry has seen us learning about the States and Territories of Australia. We have done mini investigations into each of the states and territories and found out their flags, coat of arms, flower and/or animal, capital city and location amongst other interesting facts. As part of our Art unit we are now choosing an iconic Australian landmark (either natural or human-made) and are about to start a painting in the style of Australian artist Ken Done. We will be doing 2 other types of art based on this original painting.

Coming up we have the colour explosion on the last day of school and Easter Raffle.

We will be having NAPLAN practise tests and, at the beginning of Term 2, NAPLAN testing for reading, writing, spelling and maths for our Year 3 students.

Kurrajong had their first assembly on Friday, week 6. They performed Wombat Stew, sang a rousing rendition of Morningtown Ride and did a dance to one of their favourite GoNoodle dances, which encourages brain and whole body movement breaks in and out of the classroom.

This term in Inquiry, we are learning about Changing Technology. We have been looking at different things like land transport, phones, computers and cooking methods comparing the past and present versions. In week 8, the Tuggeranong School House Museum are coming for an incursion to show the 1/2 and LSU students different items and photos from the past to assist with our inquiry into how these changes have influenced our lives.

In literacy we are currently focusing on narratives. The children thoroughly enjoy this topic as it enables many wonderful children's story books to come alive in our classroom. We have been focusing on characters and settings within the story.



Throughout this term, we have been learning all about what makes a good reader. Our classrooms are becoming print rich environments that will further encourage a love for reading. In our classrooms we have mini posters displayed and each of the children have described what makes them a good reader. Throughout the year we will be building on our understanding of reading and the reading strategies we can use to develop our learning within reading.

In maths, our focus has been number. The children have been learning about addition and subtraction and learning how to write number sentences. All our mathematical thinking has been done using hands-on learning opportunities, whilst also incorporating Numicon shapes to support learning. The children have shown lots of engagement and enthusiasm during math lessons across our unit.

For HPE, Miss Kristie is teaching the students how to play rugby league. They are practising their throwing, catching and kicking skills and working as a team. Students are also focused on social emotional learning and wellbeing, discussing and practising empathy, compassion, confidence and being kind to others in line with our new school values.
